**BISHOP WILL BE AT CONSECRATION**  
Christ Episcopal Church in Bay Ridge will hold its 75th anniversary service tomorrow morning and its consecration exercises on Monday evening. At the former service a conspicuous figure is expected to be the rector emeritus, the Rev. Bishop Falkner (Bishop being a name, not a title), who was rector of the church in the period 1901-1911. He is now 94 years of age.

An historical address, reviewing the vicissitudes of the church in the three-quarters of a century, will be given by the rector, the Rev. J. H. Fitzgerald, at the morning service. On Monday evening Bishop Ernest M. Stires will officiate at the consecration of the church building and the organ, an organ recital preceding the formal exercises.

The pastor, the Rev. Henry C. Whitney, will preach on "A Blazed Trail" at the evening service tomorrow at the Fenimore Street Methodist Church, with communion at the morning hour.

At the Flatlands Reformed Church tomorrow morning the pastor, the Rev. Charles William Roeder, will preach on "Acres of Diamonds" and in the evening on "The Message of a Great Text." Ethel Best Rowe, soprano, will sing Scott's "The Voice in the Wilderness" in the morning and in the evening "My Father Watches Over Me," by Martin-Gabriel.

At the Lutheran Church of the Reformation the Rev. H. C. Kline, pastor, will preach tomorrow morning on "The Three Factors of Salvation." In the evening his subject will be "The True God." Holy Communion will be administered for the last time until October. On June 4 Mr. Kline will represent the Synod at the Ministerium of Pennsylvania at Reading, Sunday, June 10, will be given over to a celebration of the last day of service of the old organ. The new will be ready for use in September.

At Trinity Lutheran Church the Rev. Paul H. Scer, pastor, will preach tomorrow morning on "Ebenezer." The evening service will be omitted.

At St. Luke's Episcopal Church tomorrow morning the Rev. Rush R. Sloane, rector, will preach on the Trinity. Evening services have been discontinued until fall.

The Rev. Dr. John Howland Lathrop of the Church of the Saviour on the Heights was elected a director for three years of the American Unitarian Association, which recently held its annual meeting in Boston.

The Rev. U. G. Warren, D.D., former pastor of the United Congregational Church at Lee and Hooper st. and superintendent of the Brooklyn City Missions, who is now at the First Congregational Church of Corning, N. Y., visited some of his former Brooklyn parishes last week. Toward the end of the month he will leave for a trip to California.

Children's Day will be observed in the Clinton Avenue Congregational Church tomorrow morning, when the sermon will be preached by the Rev. T. A. Symington, minister in charge. Carolyn Pope will recite the story of the Good Samaritan and Lindley Baldwin will recite the two greatest Commandments. The last midweek meeting for the season will be held in the church parlors on Wednesday evening, with the Rev. T. A. Symington as leader.

At the Central Methodist Church, opposite the Long Island Railroad Station, the Rev. J. Lane Miller, pastor, and the Rev. W. C. Judd, associate pastor, there will be communion tomorrow morning and evening. Dr. Miller will preach in the evening on "The Great Divide." The choir of 200 members sings at both services under the personal direction of Dr. Tall Esen Morgan. Mildred Rose, soprano, will be the guest soloist at the evening service.

An Older Boys' conference will be held tomorrow afternoon at Concord Baptist Church. On Sunday evening last Earl Alexander, a graduate of Ohio State and Western Reserve, spoke on "The Law of Liberty." Mrs. Mary E. Bloomer, treasurer of the Women's American Baptist Home Mission Society, told of the incompleteness of the work now being done among Mexicans, South Americans, Indians and negroes.

At the First Presbyterian Church communion service will be held tomorrow morning, with sermon by the Rev. Morgan Phelps Noyes, pastor.

At the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church the Rev. Dr. Cleland B. McAfee of Chicago will preach tomorrow morning on "What Unbelievers Miss" and in the evening on "Some Religious Problems of City Dwellers."

**Will Receive Degree**  
The Rev. Duncan M. Genns, rector of St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Brooklyn, will receive the degree of doctor of divinity from New York University at the forthcoming commencement exercises of that institution. He has one of the largest churches in point of membership in Brooklyn and is one of the leaders of the "low church" wing of that denomination, having more than once publicly protested against what he calls the drift toward Roman Catholicism in the Episcopal Church.

**UNION SUMMER SERVICES.**  
The Union summer services for the Heights Protestant churches will be held in the Reformed Church on the Heights, in Pierrepont st., the Rev. C. B. Maste. They will begin on June 17. Each church will furnish the service for two Sundays of the summer. The first three Sundays the preacher will be as follows: June 17 and 24, Mr. Maste; July 1, the Rev. R. W. F. Seebode of the Church of the Saviour. The churches uniting in these services include Plymouth, First Methodist, Reformed; Church of the New Jerusalem, Holy Trinity Episcopal and the Church of the Saviour, Unitarian.

The consecration last Sunday of Bishop Sophronios calls attention to the purpose of establishing a new organization as an independent American Orthodox Catholic Church which is to unite gradually the various Eastern Orthodox national groups in America under one American governing administration. This will free the Church in this country from the divisions and quarrels arising from the uncertain political and ecclesiastical conditions in Russia, Constantinople, Syria and Palestine, Egypt, Greece and the Balkan countries. The Orthodox Catholic immigrants and their children in America number over two million souls. The Eastern Orthodox Church has decided to give the young people religious education through the English language.

Dr. A. S. Kavanagh will speak tomorrow evening at the Ocean Parkway Methodist Church on "Lost—A Moral Antiseptic."

Mrs. Kate Upson Clark will speak at the Rugby Congregational Church tomorrow evening on "What Is a Patriot."

Commenting on the reception which the St. Albans Church, the Rev. A. L. Ash, pastor, gave to its 152 members the Presbyterian Outlook says: "A good idea for other churches to follow."

A communion service will be held tomorrow morning at the Simpson Methodist Church. Dr. Clarence Tucker Craig, the pastor, will speak briefly on "The Cup." In the evening he will preach on "Boomerangs."

The English district of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and other States will convene at Lutheran, Peconic Pines, Pa., for a conference, June 6-12. Pastors and lay delegates representing English Lutheran Churches throughout the United States, will be present.

The Rev. Victory M. Patterson, D.D., of Lambertville, N. J., will be the preacher tomorrow at the Bedford Presbyterian Church. He will preach on "Friendship With Christ" in the morning and on "Enoch" in the evening. The Business Women's Club will hold its final meeting for the season on Tuesday evening.

At the morning service tomorrow at the Cathedral of the Incarnation, Garden City, David Thomas Atwater, son of the Rev. Dr. George P. Atwater of Grace Episcopal Church, Brooklyn, recently elected suffragan bishop of Long Island, will be ordained by Bishop Ernest M. Stires. Dr. Atwater is presenting the candidate to the Bishop.

**Honored on Anniversary**  
A very happy coincidence marked the conferring of the degree of doctor of divinity on the Rev. H. H. Field of the Flatbush Presbyterian Church by Hastings, Neb. College, at its 46th annual commencement last Wednesday. The day was exactly the 20th anniversary of Dr. Field's graduation from Union Theological Seminary. He preached the baccalaureate sermon last Sunday night in the municipal auditorium of Hastings to an audience of 1,500. Hastings College is one of the oldest colleges in the West. **GIRLS NOW GUIDE CAPITOL VISITORS**  
Washington (P)—How much does the United States Capitol weigh and how did George Washington keep his wig on?  
The answers to such questions must be constantly in the pretty heads of six feminine Capitol guides whose services are available to Washington sightseers.  
If the young women do not know the answers to all the questions tourists think up, they smile sweetly and refer the seekers after knowledge to the Library of Congress.  
The "little band" of capitol guides was first invaded by a woman four years ago when Mrs. L. B. Lingo became the 13th member of the staff. The latest accession to the feminine force came a year ago in 18-year-old twin sisters, Elizabeth and Ann-Eliza Smith of Mt. Vernon, Ill. The twins admit that the first anniversary of their advent to the guide staff has seen a vast change in them.

Was Scared at First.  
"I was scared at first," said Ann-Eliza. "I'd never think of making a trip around the building without a book under my arm or at least sheets of very copious notes to which to refer. But now, after a year, the facts and figures that we must spout come as a matter of course, and I can refer to the number of steps, the height of the dome and the number of representatives without any trouble."  
Mrs. Leonora Jones was the second woman to become a guide, and the next two were Mrs. F. E. Penn Jr. and Mrs. Mary Wright.  
Fourteen other guides on a staff of 20 are now on duty. The entire force takes turns in answering calls for guides in alphabetical order. On busy days each guide makes seven or eight trips about the building, each trip lasting some 40 minutes.

**NEWS BOILED DOWN**  
GRAND DUKE ANDRE of Russia is expected to come to this country for the purpose of adding to the list of names of the Grand Duke's family. Mme. Tchaikovsky, said by some to be the Grand Duchess Anastasia, daughter of the late Czar. The Grand Duke expects to sail from Baltimore this afternoon to a dispatch from that city.

NEW AIR LINE from New York to Miami and from Detroit to Miami will operate about July 1, according to W. C. Wakefield, Detroit financier and organizer of the project. Passengers will be carried probably from the Teterboro Airport in New Jersey to Miami in 11 hours in huge, trimotored Ford cabin monoplane.

MARRIAGE LICENSES have dropped off in number this spring, according to Deputy City Clerk Thomas P. Maier of Brooklyn. There were 408 fewer licenses issued in Brooklyn in the first five months of 1928 than were issued last year in the same period.

TAX PAYMENTS yesterday poured \$57,541,834.69 into the city's treasury, the largest sum ever collected in one day. Controller Berry attributed the prompt response to this year's bills to the fact that the tax bills were mailed out.

STERLING C. WYMAN, Brooklyn's impersonator extraordinary, yesterday applied through his attorney, to Supreme Court Justice Valentine in Manhattan for a new trial on the charge of impersonating a lawyer on which he was tried, convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary, Justice Valentine reserved decision.

ANTARCTIC PLANE, the Bellanca monoplane Commander Byrd bought for his expedition to the bottom of the world, has been sold to Charles V. Bobb, financier and mining engineer, for business flights. The trimotored Fokker also bought by Byrd has been sold and that leaves him with his ship, a jet-motored Ford. He declined to discuss the sale of his planes. It was reported today that he has ordered a new Fairchild cabin monoplane.

**Gardener Dies of Stroke While Mowing Lawn**  
Harry Farrell, 62, a gardener of 64-32 60th rd., Maspeth, died of a stroke yesterday while mowing the lawn at the home of Lee Moses, 96 Meteor st., Forest Hills.  
Dr. Morgenstein of the Mary Immaculate Hospital was called and pronounced the man dead of apoplexy. The body was removed to the Simonson Morgue, Forest Hills, to await disposal by the family.
