BISHOP WILL BE AT CONSECRATION

Christ Episcopal Church in Bay Ridge will hold its 75th anniversary service tomorrow morning and its consecration exercises on Monday evening. At the former service a conspicuous figure is expected to be the rector emeritus, the Rev. Bishop Falkner (Bishop being a name, not a title), who was rector of the church in the period 1901-1911. He is now 94 years of age.

An historical address, reviewing the vicissitudes of the church in the three-quarters of a century, will be given by the rector, the Rev. J. H. Fitzgerald, at the morning service. On Monday evening Bishop Ernest M. Stires will officiate at the consecration of the church building and the organ, an organ recital preceding the formal exercises.

The pastor, the Rev. Henry C. Whitney, will preach on "A Blazed Trail" at the evening service tomorrow at the Fenimore Street Methodist Church, with communion at the morning hours.

At the Flatlands Reformed Church tomorrow morning the pastor, the Rev. Charles William Roeder, will preach on "Acres of Diamonds" and in the evening on "The Message of a Great Text." Ethel Best Rowe, soprano, will sing Scott's "The Voice in the Wilderness" in the morning and in the evening "My Father Watches Over Me," by Martin-Gabriel.

At the Lutheran Church of the Reformation the Rev. H. C. Kline, pastor, will preach tomorrow morning on "The Three Factors of Salvation." In the evening his subject will be "The True God," Holy Communion will be administered for the last time until October. On June 4 Mr. Kline will represent the Synod at the Ministerium of Pennsylvania at Reading, Sunday, June 10, will be given over to a celebration of the last day of service of the old organ. The new will be ready for use in September.

GIRLS NOW GUIDE CAPITOL VISITORS

Washington (P)—How much does the United States Capitol weigh and how did George Washington keep his wig on?

The answers to such questions must be constantly in the pretty heads of six feminine Capitol guides whose services are available to Washington sightseers.

If the young women do not know the answers to all the questions tourists think up, they smile sweetly and refer the seekers after knowledge to the Library of Congress.

The "little band" of capitol guides was first invaded by a woman four years ago when Mrs. L. B. Lingo became the 13th member of the staff. The latest accession to the feminine force came a year ago in 18-year-old twin sisters, Elizabeth and Ann-Eliza Smith of Mt. Vernon, Ill.

The twins admit that the first anniversary of their advent to the guide staff has seen a vast change in them.

Was Scared at First.

"I was scared at first," said Ann-Eliza. "I'd never think of making a trip around the building without a book under my arm or at least sheets of very copious notes to which to refer. But now, after a year, the facts and figures that we must spout come as a matter of course, and I can refer to the number of steps, the height of the dome and the number of representatives without any trouble."

Mrs. Leonora Jones was the second woman to become a guide, and the next two were Mrs. F. E. Penn Jr. and Mrs. Mary Wright.

Fourteen other guides on a staff of 20 are now on duty. The entire force takes turns in answering calls for guides in alphabetical order. On busy days each guide makes seven or eight trips about the building, each trip lasting some 40 minutes.

NEWS BOILED DOWN

GRAND DUKE ANDRE OF RUSSIA is expected to come to this country for the purpose of adding to the family of the late Czar, according to identifying Mme. Techaikovsky, said by some to be the Grand Duchess Anastasia, daughter of the late Czar. The Grand Duke expects to sail from Paris this afternoon according to a dispatch from that city.

NEW AIR LINE from New York to Miami and from Detroit to Miami will operate about July 1, according to W. C. Wakefield, Detroit financier and organizer of the project. Passengers will be carried probably from the Teterboro Airport in New Jersey to Miami in 11 hours in huge, trimotored Ford cabin monoplane.

MARRIAGE LICENSES have dropped off in number this spring, according to Deputy City Clerk Thomas P. Maier of Brooklyn. There were 408 fewer licenses issued in Brooklyn in the first five months of 1928 than were issued last year in the same period.

TAX PAYMENTS yesterday poured \$57,541,834.69 into the city's treasury, the largest sum ever collected in one day. Controller Berry attributed the prompt response to this year's bills to the fact that the tax bills were mailed out.

STERLING C. WYMAN, Brooklyn's impersonator extraordinary, yesterday applied through his attorney, to Supreme Court Justice Valentine in Manhattan for a new trial on the charge of impersonating a lawyer on which he was tried, convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary, Justice Valentine reserved decision.

ANTARCTIC PLANE, the Bellanca monoplane Commander Byrd bought for his expedition to the bottom of the world, has been sold to Charles V. Bobb, financier and mining engineer, for business flights. The trimotored Fokker also bought by Byrd has been sold and that leaves him with his ship, a jet-motored Ford. He declined to discuss the sale of his planes. It was reported today that he has ordered a new Fairchild cabin monoplane.
